Welcome to the round up of this year — it's been very busy and productive as ever!

Vale Community Hospital Allotment Scheme, Dursley

10 more beds were built at Vale Hospital in March of this year making it 51 in total. 5 are still available — priority groups are Gardening on Prescription and residents from the local new estate. We are delighted to say that we got the first lot of our own compost this year. In the allotments the veg is always ready early due to the raised beds having high sides so the sun heats soil and helps the growth.



We have communal fruit areas and we have just built a second hand shed. The polytunnel is being used well. Bird feeding and watching has become a great pastime encouraging us to leave areas dedicated to wildlife and we have plans for a wildlife pond in the autumn.

We have run workshops in Food Preservation, Seedsaving and Propagation and we plan to run one on Compost.



The Allotment Scheme has been supported by Bisley Community Composting Scheme, Garden Supplies, Tesco Bags of Help, MacMillan and Dursley Lions.

Our latest

blog, from Sally Oates, focuses on flowers for pollinating the vegetable patch, highlighting the need to create a native flourishing habitat for all our bugs and bees whilst growing to save seed.



Our Google Group is proving a good communication method for our Seed Guardians and anyone who is interested in saving seed. It is a great way to ask questions and share photos - it is open to anyone who would like to join! Fran, one of our Seed Guardians is hosting an Open Day on Sunday 14th July for anyone who would like to see a beautiful garden and see where some of our seed is grown. We also hope to organise another seed workshop before saving Autumn comes, to refresh any current seed savers and to encourage any new interest, dates TBC!

The Fruit Exchange

The Fruit Exchange connects food outlets with people who have surplus fruit or veg. It brings communities together and ensures fresh, locally grown produce is not wasted. It is now in it's 4th year.

We have had a good handful of businesses sign up in the last month, such as, the Community Kitchen in Brimscombe which aims to reduce surplus food waste, taking in excess from foodbanks, shops and now anyone involved with The Fruit Exchange, and a farm shop in Upton St Leonard's who are wanting to engage with their community and bring in

surplus and different fruit and vegetables for their menus. We Have also now signed up P3, a charity delivering services to support socially excluded and vulnerable people. This particular local food outlet is for donating fruit and vegetables only, they are not involved in the 'exchange' but will take surplus grown food if you have it. Welcome all our new local food outlets! We are now calling out for more individual growers to take part in the project, to make use of it each year and benefit from the wonderful food that all our local food outlets offer you in return.
